Some words on the final week of the regular season from a disappointed, but not dejected Rangers camp. We tried everything to keep our streak of making the post-season alive. Standing 3rd in the AL West at mid-season I felt we'd need the best 2nd half in the AL to make the playoffs and we didn't really come close to matching the excellent Mariners during that time. We ended up 50-31 but lost the critical series in NY in the final week and that really took the confidence out of the side. It was a fantastic series though - game one was a pitching duel between the Rangers Erasmi Ramirez and the Yankees Donne Wall. At least it was after Yankees lead-off hitter Felix Martinez homered in the first AB of the evening. After that pitching dominated. The Rangers threatened to tie it in the 6th but a double play ended the threat. Two singles in the 7th chased Wall and the lead was turned over to the bullpen and Jamey Wright and Glendon Rusch were perfect to protect Wall's victory. Ramirez was the hard luck starter, giving up 4 hits in 8 innings, but that crucial lead-off homer was the difference. That tied the teams on 93 wins going to game 2. The Rangers sent another LHP to the mound in the shape of the erratic Joaquin Benoit and he pitched solidly though when he left, the Yankees were up 2-1 with Delvis Lantigua pitching well. This time Simon Greener stuck with his starter but that decision came back to haunt him as Berg tied the game in the top of the 9th doubling in Loaiza and then 3b Vina homered with 2 on giving the Rangers a 5-2 lead which Alex Moreno was able to protect for the win. So to game 3 with the Rangers 1 up with 4 to play. A win for Texas would probably seal the wild card. The Rangers sent Rosman Garcia to face Edwardo Sierra but it was not a good night for pitching. The Rangers scored first but the Yankees quickly struck back and lead 6-3 after 5 innings. The Rangers re-took the lead in the 8th to lead 9-7 and then 11-7 in the top of the 9th. The Yankees hit back with a Cabrera rbi single and then a 3 run HR from Derek Jeter to tie the game at 11. Into extra innings and the Rangers scored in the top of the 10th, to go 12-11 up but in the bottom of the inning an RBI double from ex-Ranger Shipley tied the game and to the delight of the home fans (and no doubt their skipper!) Derek Jeter's RBI single won the game and the series for the Yankees and crucially tied the teams at 94 wins with 3 to play.

So the Rangers twice saw victory snatched away and it upset them. The shaky home form then came back to haunt the team as the Brewers, managed by my good friend Paul Denyer came to Arlington and shook off a disappointing game one defeat to win games 2 and 3, frankly out-playing the Rangers in those 2 games. I knew we'd need to win the series to have a shot at advancing and when I checked the final tallies, it turned out that the final 7-5 loss to the Brewers was crucial, though in my heart I knew the damage had been done by the Yankees come from behind

On offence we rode the hot bat of Ryan Church most of the season but weren't quite able to support him at the end. Church has to be in with a great shot at league MVP and the Triple Crown of BAvg, HR and RBI leader. His final marks were .389, 58 HR, 184 RBI and if this turns out to be his final season it will be one heck of a way to go out. The season did start out as a rebuilding year and 95 wins is a good return, though not quite good enough. Good luck to all in the playoffs.
